Request for your visit to the A-bombed cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki

Excellency:

We hope this letter finds you in the best of health and spirits.

We would like to request that you visit the A-bombed cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki on the occasion of the G20 Foreign Ministers' Meeting to be held in Japan this November.

The atomic bombs dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki in August 1945 reduced our cities to ashes in an instant and took many precious lives. Our *hibakusha* who managed to survive, while suffering the aftereffects of radiation and facing discrimination and prejudice, continue to tell their painful stories to ensure that no one else in the world experiences the horror of another nuclear attack. Now their average age is over 82 and their ardent wish is nothing but the realization of a world free from nuclear weapons.

Through the visits to our cities, we would like for you to deepen your understanding of the actual damage wrought by a single atomic bomb and the *hibakusha*'s ardent wish for peace. We also sincerely hope that you will share the recognition that a world without nuclear weapons is our common goal, and take actions towards the abolition of nuclear weapons with reason and insight as we call on all world leaders.
