

## Chapter 7 Hiroshima today

Through the efforts of many people, the city devastated by the atomic bomb was reborn as a city blessed with water and greenery.

In 1980, Hiroshima became the 10th ordinance-designated city in Japan, and its cultural facilities were also upgraded. Through mergers with neighboring towns and villages, the city's area expanded to 906.69 km<sup>2</sup>, approximately 34 times the area when Hiroshima became a city. The population, which was down to 137,197 in November 1945, was 1,169,111 as of the end of August 2025.

Today, the City of Hiroshima, the world's first city to have suffered an atomic bombing, tries to realize its vision to develop as an "international city of peace and culture," and endeavors to spread the "culture of peace" around the world, calling on the global community to ensure that nuclear weapons will never be used again.




